## **Chronology: Samuel Lawrence Feinstein (1915 – 2003)**

1915	Shmeil Feinstein born on February 7th in Voronovitza, Ukraine, Russia to Joel and Bela Feinstein.
1922	Emigrates with family to United States and settles in Philadelphia, PA.
1936	Graduates with honors from the Pennsylvania Museum School of Industrial Arts, later known as the Philadelphia Museum College of Art and still later the University of the Arts.
	Receives the gold medal in the Philadelphia Sketch Club's annual exhibition of small oil paintings.
	Exhibits his paintings in his first one-man show at the Philadelphia Art Alliance.
	Exhibits a painting in the "American Masters" show at the Philadelphia Museum of Art.
1936 – 1959	Exhibits paintings, drawings and prints, first in Philadelphia, and after 1950, also in New York City and Provincetown, MA.
1936 – 1937	Teaches painting at the Pennsylvania Museum School of Industrial Art.
1936 – 1938	Works as commercial artist and art director for Philip Klein, Inc. in Philadelphia.
1938	Teaches etching at the Graphic Sketch Club.
1938 – 1940	Works as Art Director for N. W. Ayers and Sons, an advertising agency in Philadelphia.
1938 – 1942	Teaches art at Chestnut Hill Academy, a private boys' school in the Germantown area of Philadelphia. Becomes Director of the Art Department. Establishes community art gallery in the school.
1938	Moves to South Camac Street in Philadelphia. Weds Anna Beryl Cook. (The marriage ends after two years.)
1939	Receives an award for his oil portrait The Voter from the DaVinci Alliance of Philadelphia.
1940	Moves to a loft above a gas station at 1912 Cherry Street in Philadelphia.
1942	Weds Barbara Anne Crawford.
	Completes courses in camouflage and enlists in the U.S. Army.
1942 – 1945	Serves in the Pictorial Services Division in the Medical Field Services School at Carlisle Barracks near Harrisburg, PA. Wins awards for his posters. Receives training in animation and filmmaking at the Signal Corps Photographic Center in Astoria, Queens, NY. Honorably discharged in June,1945.
1945 – 1946	Teaches art history at Springside, a private girls' school associated with Chestnut Hill Academy.
1945 – 1947	Works as Animator/Art Director for Philip Ragan Associates, Inc., a documentary film company in Philadelphia. Creates animation of atomic fission for award-winning film <i>One World or None</i> .
1947 – 1948	Teaches and supervises classes at the Philadelphia Museum of Art. Films the artist Franklin Watkins painting the portrait of former Supreme Court Justice Owen J. Roberts for the first art documentary produced by the Philadelphia Museum of Art.
1947	Begins working in NYC as Animator/Art Director for Frederic House, Inc., later for Caravel Films and Murphy-Lillis, Inc. (Commutes to Philadelphia each weekend where he lives with Barbara in the loft on Cherry Street and continues teaching and supervising classes at the Philadelphia Museum of Art.)
1949 – 1952	Attends Hans Hofmann's classes in Provincetown each summer.
1950 – 1960	Spends entire summer in Provincetown, where he lives at 73A Commercial Street in front of Captain Jack's Wharf opposite the Hofmann house.
1950	Commences work on his documentary <i>Hans Hofmann</i> . Films Hofmann painting <i>The Window</i> . (The painting was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Roy R. Neuberger and donated to the Metropolitan Museum of Art in 1951.)
1950	Resigns from corporate employment and establishes himself as freelance artist/animator for films working out of his New York studio at 673 Broadway.
1950 & 1952	Receives award at Philadelphia Printmaker's Annual. His woodcuts <i>Black Walnuts</i> and <i>Wharf's End</i> become a part of the permanent collection of the Philadelphia Museum of Art.
1950 – 1953	Teaches "Animation for Television" at Pratt Institute, NYC.
1951 – 1956	Exhibits paintings in annual juried shows at the Provincetown Art Association.
1952 – 1955	Becomes Philadelphia correspondent and then Contributing Editor for <i>Art Digest</i> , reviewing the Whitney Annual in 1953, the Arensburg Collection at the Philadelphia Museum of Art, the Ur Collection at the University of Pennsylvania and many individual art exhibitions in New York and Philadelphia.
1952	Teaches art classes in Philadelphia at the Ellen Donovan Gallery where his paintings are exhibited.
1953	Purchases and renovates a carriage house at 2008 Chancellor Street in Center City, Philadelphia, where his classes meet weekly for the next fifty years. (This also becomes the Jung Center of Philadelphia under Barbara's direction.)
1953 – 1954	Writes the brochure for Hans Hofmann's exhibition at the Kootz Gallery in New York. Works with Hofmann on the wording of Hofmann's essay "The Color Problem in Pure Painting" that Hofmann then dedicates to Sam.
1955 & 1956	Serves on the Modern Jury at the Provincetown Art Association.

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1955	<b>–</b> 1958	Co-founds and serves as president of Group '55, a group of artists, composers, architects and art historians that organized forums to advance the understanding of art in general, and abstract art in particular.
1957		Begins teaching additional classes, studio/samfeinstein, in New York in the winter and Cape Cod in the summer.
		Separates from Barbara. They eventually divorce.
		Moves to a loft on West 25th Street in New York, and later to another loft on West 29th Street.
1958		Sells a painting to Walter P. Chrysler for the Chrysler Museum Collection.
1958		Exhibits paintings at the Dubin Gallery in his final one man show in Philadelphia.
1959		Exhibits paintings at the HCE Gallery in his final one man show in Provincetown.
1960		Purchases a house, barn and studio in Dennis, MA on Cape Cod and departs from Provincetown.
1962		Marries Anita Ingrid Sofia Askild.
1963		His son Joel Anders Alexis Feinstein, known as "Sascha," is born.
1964		Begins teaching weekly class in Princeton, NJ.
1965		Purchases a brownstone on the Upper West Side in NYC, his primary residence for the remainder of his life.
1966		Curates an exhibition of abstract expressionist paintings at the McCarter Theater in Princeton.
1971		Teaches at the Institute of Awareness in Philadelphia.
1975	- 1978	Leads monthly gallery talks in New York.
1977		Suffers his first heart attack, but quickly recovers.
1978		Travels with Anita and Sascha through central Mexico and the Yucatan.
1979	- 1980	Anita becomes ill with cancer and dies on April 15 <sup>th</sup> , 1980.
1983	<b>– 1985</b>	Teaches, assisted by Patricia "Pat" Stark, a four-day art workshop in Michigan at The Farm, a conference center directed by Gestalt therapists Neal and Pat Lamper,
1984		Recovers from a second heart attack and bypass surgery.
1984	- 2000	Teaches a three-day art workshop each year in Toronto, Canada, with Pat as teaching assistant.
1985		Organizes a memorial exhibition of Anita's art at the Scargo Stoneware Pottery Gallery in Dennis, MA.
		Participates in group exhibition at the newly formed Cape Cod Museum of Art in Dennis, MA.
		Marries Patricia Louise Stark. Travels with Pat to Cuzco and Machu Picchu in Peru.
1986		Exhibits his paintings at the Scargo Stoneware Pottery Gallery in Dennis, MA. Explains his art and philosophy in a documentary filmed at the gallery.
1988		Travels with Pat throughout northern Italy.
1992		Travels with Pat through Holland, Belgium, France and Spain.
1998		Lectures at the Cape Cod Museum of Art.
1999		Completes his film <i>Hans Hofmann</i> and gives a slide lecture at its premier on October 9 <sup>th</sup> at the Metropolitan Museum of Art on the occasion of a special Hofmann exhibit. One of his drawings is displayed at the museum with the work of other Hofmann students. Two of his drawings become part of their permanent collection.
2000		Screens the film Hans Hofmann at the Cape Cod Museum of Art and the Provincetown Art Association.
		Recovers from second open-heart surgery.
2001		Organizes, with Pat, a retrospective of Anita's work at the Cape Cod Museum of Art.
2002		Suffers a serious illness but continues painting and teaching.
2003		Dies at his summer home in Dennis, Massachusetts on June 10 <sup>th</sup> .
